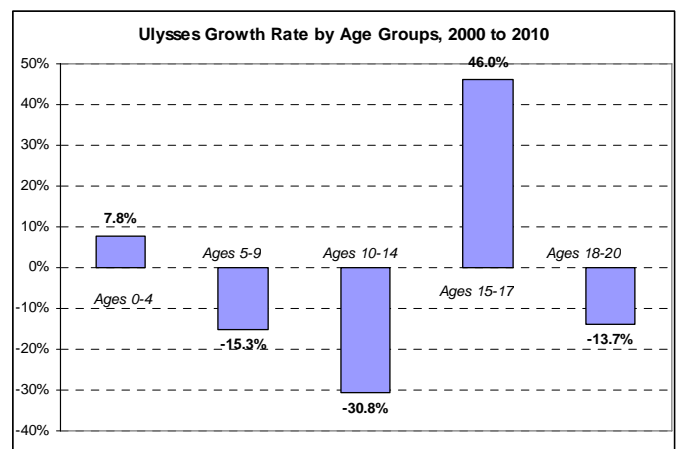

3. Youth Population

The Town of Ulysses lost youth population between 2000 and 2010. Age groups 0 – 4 and 15 – 17 are larger than they were 10 years ago; age groups 5 – 9, 10 – 14, and 18 – 20 are smaller. In 2000, Ulysses ranked 4th among Tompkins towns in youth population, ages 0 – 17; in 2010, it ranks 7th.

Approximately 5.9% of Tompkins County youth, ages 0 – 17, live in Ulysses.

Trumansburg's rate of graduates with Regents Diplomas has, in general, risen over the last 10 years. Trumansburg's drop out rate has been at or below the county average for 8 of the last 10 years.

The NYS Board of Regents phased in new standards for high schools. Starting in 2003, high school students were required to pass Regents exams in the core areas of English, math, social studies and science in order to graduate from high school.

*A Person in Need of Supervision (PINS) is a youth under the age of eighteen who is showing a pattern of habitual disobedience, running away, curfew violations, substance abuse, violent behavior, or school truancy problems. Pre-PINS Diversion Services attempt to resolve the conflicts that brought a youth to the attention of the Probation Department by offering supervision, guidance, and referrals to community resources, thus preventing the need for formal Family Court intervention. Pre-PINS Diversion is a mandatory prerequisite prior to filing a formal PINS petition in Family Court.
